

## ROADMAP FOR REOPENING NASHVILLE

The City of Nashville has created the following plan to get the city back to work.

The hard truth is that our city will be living with COVID-19 until there is an effective vaccine for the virus.

Living with COVID-19 means returning to work with COVID-19.

We must proceed carefully to ensure that we do not create a surge that will send us all back home.

Nashville’s economy will open in phases. We will only move to the next phase if there is positive improvement/stability in the metrics for an acceptable period, with a minimum of 14 days between phases.
